Auto Detailing

Did you ever wonder what would get done if you had your vehicle detailed?

Depending upon where you go, what gets done may be different but one thing is for sure, it should be more than a wash, wax and vacuum.

It may involve cleaning out the vents and getting into those hard to reach places like around the buttons on the dash. Plastic and vinyl pieces are often cleaned and treated to resist fading and cracking. Carpets can be shampooed or steam cleaned. Some even go as far as to perform cleaning further beneath. That might include the under carriage and in the wheel wells. Even your engine can be treated with degreasers to remove build up and plastic parts be treated to protectorates. The icing on the cake could be the addition of that "new car smell".

The time to perform these tasks could be up to a full day depending on what type of package you opt for your vehicle. The cost for this type of service could run from as little as \$50 to upwards of \$200 for a more deluxe package.
